# **DEADLINES**

CHUGACH NATIONAL FOREST – Comments are due on the proposal to AMEND THE 2020 LAND MANAGEMENT PLAN. Due to a mapping error, approximately 35 acres of National Forest System (NFS) lands at Trinity Point located on the south side of Passage Canal near the City of Whittier, were not included in the 2020 Chugach National Forest Plan. When the error was discovered, an Administrative Change was made to the Forest Plan to assign that parcel a Recreation Opportunity Spectrum1 (ROS) classification of Semi-Primitive Motorized2. While this was consistent with the previous Forest Plan's ROS designation for that area, it does not meet Forest Service Manual 2300 Chapter 10 (Exhibit 01) direction that outlines the characteristics that define areas that are designated with a Semi-Primitive Motorized ROS class. Characteristics that are not met by the lands at Trinity Point are: • Size: Lands designated as Semi-Primitive Motorized should be 2,500 acres or greater in size. The parcel of land at Trinity Point is 35 acres and is surrounded by City of Whittier lands that are proposed for development in the future. • Access: Roads in the Semi-Primitive Motorized ROS class are designed primarily for off-highway, or high clearance, vehicle traffic. In the fall of 2018 construction was completed on a 2.0-mile segment of Shotgun Cove Road. The road was constructed and is currently maintained for passenger vehicle use. In 2021 The Shotgun Cove Extension Environmental Assessment approved extending the existing road an additional 2.5 miles to end on NFS lands

at Trinity Point. The project approved construction of a vehicle turn-around loop, and a parking lot for approximately 50 vehicles. The proposed amendment would change the ROS Class at Trinity Point from Semi-Primitive Motorized to Roader Natural3. The Chugach National Forest Supervisor is the Responsible Official for this amendment affecting only the 35 acres of land located at Trinity Point. Although this amendment would modify the language and direction for ROS management at Trinity Point in the Forest Plan, it would not approve projects or activities, nor would it propose ground-disturbing activities. The draft assessment for the TONGASS FOREST PLAN REVISION is available for comment. The purpose of this assessment is to rapidly evaluate existing information about relevant ecological, economic, and social conditions, trends and sustainability, and document their relationship to the Tongass land management plan within the context of the broader landscape. In the coming months the team will be working on the Draft Assessment so that it will be ready for review at the beginning of next year. In the meantime, we want to share the current framework of the assessment document with you, as well as the literature we have gathered for the different topics that make up the full assessment. This framework is in the form of a Table of Contents which is currently in a DRAFT, working state. The table of contents outlines all the different subjects that are currently slated to be discussed in the full draft assessment. **NENANA** – Comments are due on the proposal to **REPLACE the PARKS HIGHWAY NENANA RIVER BRIDGE**. at Rex Crossing near MP 276. Replacement of the bridge will require a work trestle on the south side of the existing bridge and a temporary bridge placed on the north side of the bridge to be used as a detour route. DOT&PF is currently working on conceptual designs, engineering, and environmental studies. Construction is planned for summer 2028. Portions of the existing Nenana River Bridge at Rex Crossing are within the base floodplain of the Nenana River in the form of bank protection (riprap) at both ends of the bridge and three piers. Also comment on whether to update protected areas in the Western arctic, including whether to expand such areas, modify existing boundaries or management, or designate new protected areas. Comments are solicited on whether to initiate a process to consider adding additional protection measures, including by identifying additional significant resource values in existing Special Areas, expanding Special Areas, or creating new Special Areas within NPR. Under the Naval Petroleum Reserves Production Act (NPRP-A) of 1976, as amended, Congress directed the BLM to balance oil and gas development with the "maximum protection" of the significant surface resources and values in the Special Areas. The final rule updates the existing regulatory framework, adopted more than 40 years ago, allowing the BLM to respond more effectively to changing conditions in the NPR-A, while striking a balance between oil and gas development and the management and protection of surface values, including wildlife habitat vital to subsistence.
