SKAGWAY – Comments are due on the Notice to Begin Engineering & Environmental Studies for the **SKAGWAY KLONDIKE HIGHWAY ROCKFALL MITIGATION PROJECT** to mitigate rockfall hazards on the Klondike Highway. The proposed project would take place in an area which has not been officially mapped for floodplains. We have conducted a hydrological study and determined that the project and area is a low flood risk due to its location and geology. Construction is projected to begin in the summer of 2025. Possible affected resources include floodplains, Section 4(f) properties, invasive plants, and cultural or historic properties. Your comments will help us evaluate potential environmental, social, and economic impacts of this project, as well as impacts to historic and cultural resources. The following Project Priority Lists have been updated: Alaska Clean Water Fund: Base Grant and BIL General Supplemental Grant; Alaska Drinking Water Fund: Base Grant and BIL General Supplemental Grant; and BIL Emerging Contaminants Grant. The **Project Priority Lists** are components of the Intended Use Plans which demonstrate how Alaska intends to use funds made available through the federal Clean Water State Revolving Fund (CWSRF) and the Drinking Water State Revolving Fund (DWSRF). WASILLA - Comments are due on the Notice of Flood Encroachment & Intent to Begin Engineering and Environmental Studies for the BOGARD ROAD and WASILLA CREEK from TRUNK ROAD to GRUMMAN CIRCLE, a distance of approximately 3 miles. The purpose of the proposed project is to upgrade the aforementioned section of Bogard Road to an arterial highway standard to address safety and capacity issues. The proposed project would encroach into the base (100-year) floodplain associated with Wasilla Creek. Additional encroachments into unmapped floodplains associated with Cottonwood Creek or other small waterways intersecting the project may occur. Potential impacts to the base & unmapped floodplains would include installation of functionally dependent structures such as culverts, bridges, and other drainage features. No longitudinal or significant encroachment is anticipated as a result of the project and no net change to base flood elevations is expected to result from construction of the project. Construction for the proposed project is anticipated to begin in 2032. ITEMS of INTEREST

**The new CASTNER GLACIER RECREATION AREA MANAGEMENT PLAN (RAMP).has been signed by the Bureau of Land Management Alaska that will help the BLM better serve the estimated 12,000 annual visitors and the growing demand for recreation opportunities in the area. The BLM manages approximately 4,695-acre Castner Glacier area that provides year-round outdoor recreation and glacier viewing opportunities in a natural setting. The area is 48 miles from the nearest town (Delta Junction) and 104 miles from the BLM's Glennallen Field Office and includes little infrastructure development or basic services. The new RAMP lays out the BLM's vision and plan for these lands. This plan helps guide activities, especially commercial and group activities, within the Castner Glacier area. Vehicle use, trail designations, and land use authorizations are also guided by this plan. An accompanying TRAVEL MANAGEMENT PLAN (TMP) was also approved which clarifies seasons of use and designated trails for motorized vehicles. The RAMP also increases the number of commercial special recreation permits (SRPs) allowed in the area from the existing four up to 15 permits in response to significant growth and interest in commercial groups and tours in the area. With this decision signed, the BLM is now accepting applications for commercial SRPs through the BLM Recreation and Permit Tracking Online Reporting (RAPTOR) system. The new **CENTRAL YUKON RESOURCE MANAGEMENT PLAN (RMP) has been released and is available at the BLM National NEPA Register, updating management for nearly 13.3 million acres of public lands in central and northern Alaska. This plan covers management of portions of the central Yukon River watershed and the Dalton Highway utility corridor. It emphasizes important habitats for several fish and wildlife species and other subsistence resources that are vital to rural Alaskans, including Alaska Native communities. In response to declining populations of subsistence resources, such as Yukon River salmon and caribou, the new plan makes designations to help protect important habitat on BLM-managed public lands. These measures include designation of approximately 3.6 million acres of Concerto protect important habitat areas and support important subsistence resources, 746,000 acres as caribou core habitat areas for two non-migratory herds, and 4,600 acres as Dall sheep habitat areas. The plan replaces several outdated management plans and provides guidance for areas west of Fairbanks that previously did not have management plans.

The FINAL RECORD of DECISION and FINAL ENVIRONMENTAL ANALYSIS for the GREENS CREEK MINE EXTENSION PROJECT is available at

https://www.fs.usda.gov/project/?project=57306. The decision provides additional capacity for disposal of mining waste material and increased measures to protect nearby habitats. The extension allows Greens Creek to continue its production for 12-18 more years. The first phase of expansion begins immediately and will provide the mine with approximately 1.9 million cubic yards of additional tailings disposal capacity over the first three years. An additional 2.7 million cubic yards, through components of phase two, is projected to happen in years eight through ten.

The RECORD of DECISION (ROD) for the ANCSA 17(D)(1) WITHDRAWALS

ENVIRONMENTAL IMPACT STATEMENT was signed by the Secretary of Interior on August 23, 2024. The ROD contains the details of the Secretary's decision to retain the ANCSA withdrawals on lands within the Bay, Bering Sea-Western Interior, East Alaska, Kobuk-Seward Peninsula, and Ring of Fire planning areas; Alaska. **ENVIRONMENTAL EDUCATOR (SPRING SEASON) with the CENTER for ALASKAN

COASTAL STUDIES in Homer and Kachemak Bay. Instill wonder, scientific understanding, and love for coastal ecosystems with students from throughout Alaska. The Spring Environmental Educator will co-lead overnight educational programs with the Center for Alaskan Coastal Studies (CACS) in semi-remote and semi-rustic locations around Kachemak Bay.
