Comments are due on the proposal for TONGASS NATIONAL FOREST GREENS CREEK
SURFACE EXPLORATION proposed mineral explorations that would authorize HECLA Greens
Creek Mining Company to explore for mineral deposits, including silver, zinc, lead and gold rich volcanogenic massive sulfide mineralization for up to 1 year. Past exploration by HECLA
Greens Creek Mine identified geologic and geochemical targets which require further exploration. Of the proposed activities, diamond core drilling is most essential. To minimize impacts, helicopters would be used for transporting large, flyable core drilling rigs, crews,

equipment, and supplies to diamond core drilling platform sites. The Greens Creek Mine is on Admiralty Island approximately 18 miles southwest of Juneau, Alaska and 40 miles north of Angoon. Comments are due on the proposed general permit by DEC for a **GENERAL PERMIT TO ALLOW APPLICATION of SPECIFIC PESTICIDES to CONTROL INVASIVE WEEDS**. Only invasive weed control projects overseen or managed by state agencies, such as Soil and Water Conservation Districts, would be eligible for coverage under the proposed General Permit. Only specific invasive weeds would be treated under the proposed General Permit. This General Permit will allow only the use of specific herbicides, which are all available over the counter and have a significant history of use.
